Who were Dick (11-29-1926 - 8-09-2018) and Jeanie (6-14-1930 - 5-12-2016) Collins? They were



extremely talented, loving, sharing and giving members of the Swift Museum Foundation. Records show they became members of the International Swift Association (later to become Swift Museum Foundation, Inc.) in 1974. Dick and Jeanie further demonstrated their love and commitment to the Swift and the organization by later becoming Life Members of SMF.

They would routinely fly their Swift to Swift National, Sun N Fun, Oshkosh and other points across the U.S. from their home in California. You would always find Dick and Jeanie actively involved in volunteering at Swift National. Jeanie spent many hours helping out in the Swift store and Dick could always be found conducting forums, parking Swifts, setting up, and helping out wherever he was needed. Their activity

was not limited to their time at events. Jeanie was a very talented graphic designer and designed artwork for many of our Swift National shirts, hats, and other Swift store items. Jeanie and Dick were talented, multi-faceted, accomplished, individuals.

Dick and Jeanie's giving spirt continues. They have left "A Gift That Continues Giving" by naming the Swift Museum Foundation, Inc. as a recipient of a legacy gift. In May of this year the Swift Museum Foundation, Inc. received from the Collins estate a check in the amount of \$236,874.20. When the estate is completely closed there may be an additional \$12,000.00 - \$15,000.00 sent to the SMF.

The following comments are from long time Swift member Gerry 'Doc' Mahoney of Diamond Point, WA.

"Frog,

Collins bought the present Swift on September 1964. He overhauled the entire airframe and installed the Lycoming O-360-A1A, as part of the STC he developed. N80772, was a GC-1A, built in June, 1946. It had 754 hours on the airframe at that time. Dick, put 3500 hours on it while he had it. The STC, is STC#SA1680WE, and covers the entire airframe. We have been providing letters to folks to use the Data on their aircraft, primarily the Pitot mast and battery installation. With each have a drawing.

The total time on the airframe is 4296 hours. Dick, and Jeanie, flew it to Anchorage, AK, and Maine. I do not know how many trips to Athens, & Oshkosh. I have not found any Pilot log books in the stuff I have.


Jeanie learned to fly and got her Certificate in Wenatchee, WA. I believe she had her ticket before Dick got his. Dick, was a mechanic, and Instructor, at San Carlos, Airport, before he went to Engineering School in San Francisco, then moved on to Hiller, Helicopters, in Palo Alto, CA. He met Jeanie, at the Palo Alto Airport where she worked for Nystrom, Aviation, which was a Swift, and Navion, Dealer. She was their Navion, Ferry/Delivery pilot. Jeanie's maiden name was Cryor.

Dick, had a GC-IB, earlier, and flew it t visit my family at the Bryce Canyon Airport, in Utah. The field was at 7,800'. He stuffed my sister and I into the Swift and we flew out over the Park. I remember the Swift gobbling up most of the 8,000' runway. That was about 1950. He came back with Jeannie for their Honeymoon about 1952/53? I was in the 5<sup>th</sup> grade. I became the Red Headed Stepchild about 1959, when I graduated HS, and left Oklahoma City the next day. I went west in search of something, I do not know what, but I seldom left the west coast. Dick, Jeanie, and I, had a lot of good trips with the Swifts over the years.



Bill Shepherd, said Dick and Jeanie were at Kentucky Dam before 1970 with N80772. Probably check records from Kentucky Dam before 1979, I know he was flying it in 1967. I have known Dick since I was 5 years old.

We built the house when I was stationed at Lemoore, CA, and we were off and running with the water ski's, and airplanes. It was a great ride. Gerry''


