Part 3 – War on the Home Front

Most Swift owners are aware of the sacrifices made on the home front during WWII. They were made by our parents and grandparents who were not called to serve overseas, but who "served" admirably, whether in the military stationed in the US, or as private citizens doing their part for victory.




Globe factory workers fall into the latter group, and the "Globe Beam" magazine chronicles the era they lived in. The pages are full of articles encouraging car-pooling (save gas and rubber), bond drives, blood drives, scrap metal drives, rationing, production efficiency, and the need for security (loose lips sink ships, and down airplanes). A message in the January 1943 magazine encouraging production depicts Hitler, Mussolini, and Tojo as bowling pins. The pins are being struck down by a bowling ball labeled "MORE PRODUCTION."




Landing Gear Power Point CD by Al Hathy
