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Executive Director's Report By Scott Anderson

We have recently received some of the long awaited new FAA/PMA approved Adel gear struts being produced for the Foundation by McFarlane Aviation. FAA/PMA approval is required for our new parts since our Swifts are certified aircraft. There were many factors in the delays of getting the new struts made. Delays due to Covid, (of course) the unavailability of the original materials, plus changes in the chroming process since the forties, and the big one..... the FAA would not approve the drawings to produce the struts with the existing A.D. on the strut. This forced the engineers at McFarlane to completely redesign the strut. New materials had to be used and processes changed, but the best part is that the A.D. no longer exists on the new parts.

A stronger strut, better chrome and no A.D. is the result. Great! But all this comes with a cost. They will be more expensive than the struts we had in the past but they will still be much more affordable than some of the other personal aircraft parts prices. Check on Beech, Piper and Cessna struts. We did and we were astounded! The fact that we now have them available is paramount.

Gear struts are not something that you could easily or inexpensively made on your own but they are something that will keep your Swift grounded if your struts need to be replaced. We will also soon be receiving new FAA/ PMA approved bronze bushings for the Adel struts.

Next, we are moving ahead with the replacements for the chrome inner tube assembly for the tail wheel shock absorber. These are becoming increasingly scarce. We hope they will be easier to have made since there is no A.D. on them.

Swift has invested heavily in these parts in order to keep supporting your aircraft with the items that are the most difficult for owners to find or fabricate. Our pricing is structured to give members the best deal possible. At the same time, it allows us to provide the parts and funding to keep the shelves stocked as well as work on providing more new parts that Swift owners require to keep their pride and joy in top condition.
